



CGI unfurls biggest Tricolor at Times Square

This is the second consecutive year when FIA organized the Independence Day celebrations at the iconic Times Square in New York; for the first time, I-Day messages were on display at the biggest jumbotron reserved by FIA for full 24 hours

#NEW YORK

he Times Square was a sight to behold on Sunday morning. Every time the crowd shouted out 'Jai' to complete the slogan "Bharat Mata ki..." or "Mataram" after "Vande", the Sunday morning air reverberated with indescribable energy. The towering Tricolor bore testimony to the spirit that had brought Indians together to celebrate a momentous occasion.

This occasion was the 75th Independence Day of India.

The venue was the iconic Times Square.

Befitting the grandeur of the occasion, the Federation of Indian Associations had organized the unfurling of the biggest Tricolor at the Times Square. The flag, 6ft x 10 ft, was hoisted on a 25-feet pole.

An ode to freedom fighters

India celebrated its 75th Independence Day on Sunday; PM Narendra Modi kicked off the celebrations by hoisting the Tricolor at Red Fort in New Delhi; country will celebrate the year as 'Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsav'

#NEW DELHI

ndia celebrated its 75th Independence Day on Sunday, marking a significant milestone in the history of the world's largest democracy.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi led the celebrations by hoisting the Indian National Flag from the ramparts of the Red Fort in New Delhi. Top political leaders in India, chiefs of the three armed forces, foreign ambassadors, top bureaucrats, India's Tokyo Olympic contingent, and other dignitaries attended the celebrations in the national capital.

In his customary address after the flag hoisting ceremony, Modi paid tribute to all the leaders who had taken part in the freedom struggle.

"Be it Nehru ji, the first Prime Minister of India, Sardar Patel, who united the country, or Babasaheb Ambedkar, who showed India the way to the future, the country is indebted to all of them," the Prime Minister said.

The PM also announced a \$1.35 trillion (Rs. 100 lakh crore) Gatishakti initiative aimed at holistic infrastructure growth, creating employment opportunities for the youth, and expanding the use of cleaner fuels to achieve the country's climate goals.

Indian National Congress President Sonia Gandhi hoisted the tricolor at the party headquarters in Delhi. Her son Rahul Gandhi and other senior party leaders were present on the occasion.

President Ram Nath Kovind visited the National War Memorial in Delhi and paid tributes to the soldiers who laid their lives for the country.

Superstar Amitabh Bachchan and actors Akshay Kumar, Kangana Ranaut, Alia Bhatt, and other Bollywood celebrities shared their wishes on the occasion.

In state capitals, respective

chief ministers led the flag hoisting ceremonies and the Independence day celebrations. Private celebrations of the event were also organized in cities across India.

However, the celebrations of the 75th year of India's independence will continue until August 15, 2023. The Indian government launched the 'Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav' from Mahatma Gandhi's home Sabarmati Ashram in Ahmedabad in March this year, and a host of events have been planned as a part of the celebrations over the next two years.

President Biden extends I-Day greetings

In a statement, US President Joe Biden extended his wishes to those celebrating India's Independence Day.

"Over the decades, the ties between our people, including a vibrant community of more than four million Indian-Americans, have sustained and strengthened our partnership," President Biden said.

He noted the special bond between the world's oldest and largest democracies.

FIA ships 3rd consignment of Covid cargo to India

#NEW YORK

aking forward its commitment to its motherland, India, the Federation of Indian Associations of the tristate area of New York, New Jersey and Connecticut (FIA-NY NJ CT) successfully dispatched the third consignment of medical supplies to India last week. That this happened just days before the country celebrated its 75th Independence Day made the occasion even more special.

The consignment is part of the donation by the City of New York to India as the country prepares for a likely third wave of the Covid-19 pandemic.

The consignment, which was sent via air from New York to New Delhi, comprises 4452 Resmed Bi-Pap machines and 6980 additional parts and consumables for these machines. This will help hospitals and healthcare institutes treat patients with breathing difficulty, one of the most common complications seen in Covid-19 patients.

The consignment has been sent to the Foundation for Innovation and Social Entrepreneurship in India. ACT Grants will be managing the last mile distribution to local health care facilities such as Uttar Pradesh government's healthcare system as well as to the charitable healthcare facilities across the nation free of cost.

FIA believes that these supplies will make an impact to needy communities across the nation and will help in the war against Covid-19.

India, we stand with you

In April-May this year, India had struggled with a disastrous second wave of the Covid-19 pandemic. At that time, the health infrastructure of the country had come under severe stress, one of the reasons being shortage of medical supplies. Several lives were lost because of this shortage.

The cargo comprised 400,000 pulse oxymeters, ventilators, resuscitation bags, BiPAP machines, test kits, etc. It was shipped from Keasbey, NJ to Navi Mumbai. Ventilators were sent via Air India. The supplies were donated by the City of New York, while the rest of the logistics related to the shipment were handled by FIA.

General secretary and executive committee member of FIA-NY NJ CT Parveen Bansal led the logistical efforts.

On the occasion, FIA chairman Ankur Vaidya once again thanked the New York City, sponsors and the entire FIA team for their support.

"India is celebrating the 75th year of its independence. By fighting for the freedom and dignity of their motherland, the freedom fighters fulfilled their duties towards India. Now, it's the turn of current generations to do their bit. With these shipments, I would like to reiterate that our motherland is always in our thoughts," said Vaidya.





The country bagged seven medals at the recently concluded Tokyo Olympics, its highest tally so far




The rocket launcher

By the time the country took note of him as he advanced, he had already found his place among the top throwers. He qualified for the finals after the first throw itself. His performance in the finals was par excellence. The entire country watched with bated breath as he began taking his strides. The rest, as they say, is history. His javelin covered 87.58 metres. Neeraj created history that day by becoming the first Indian to win a gold in athletics. He gave India's Tokyo Olympic run a picture-perfect finish.

Wrestlers win laurels



Wrestler Ravi Dahiya had his eyes set on gold after a phenomenal victory over Nurislam Sanayev of Kazakhstan in the semi-finals. But he could not get the better of Zavur Uguev of Russia in the 57 kg category finals. He settled for silver. That became the second silver for India after the one won by weightlifter Mirabai Chanu.

With this win, Ravi became only the the fifth wrestler in India to have won an Olympic medal. He follows KD Jadhav, Sushil Kumar, Yogeshwar Dutt and Sakshi Malik.

Meanwhile, Bajrang Punia was sure he would make it to the podium. But his loss in the semifinals of the men's freestyle 65 kg wrestling category came as a huge disappointment not just to him, but to the entire country. However, he bounced back in the play-off to lift the bronze medal after defeating Daulet Niyazbekov of Kazakhstan 8-0.



A shout-out for hockey teams

It is said that cricket unites India. But when the Indian hockey teams were playing in Tokyo, the entire country switched the television channels from cricket to tune into hockey. That was the effect this season had. The Indian men's team returned home with a bronze after losing in the semi-finals and later winning in the play-off match. The girls weren't as lucky. They lost in the play-off. But they, too, were given a hero's welcome. For, it was for the first time that the Indian women's hockey team had advanced to the semi-finals.

Dandi Statement beyond imagination

The Salt Satyagraha that Mahatma Gandhi undertook in March 1930, from Sabarmati Ashram in Ahmedabad to Dandi coast in Navsari marked the launch of the Civil Disobedience Movement against the British rule in India

alt tax in India had been at the centre of lot of criticism several years before Mahatma Gandhi protested against it. However, the breaking of the salt tax law was symbolic in more than one ways. It was the launch of the Civil Disobedience Movement that grew to pave the way for freedom of India from the British Rule.

It was on March 12, 1930, that 78 people led by Mahatma Gandhi set out from Sabarmati Ashram in Ahmedabad for the Dandi coast where they intended to break the salt law. They walked for 21 days, covering nearly 387 kilometers to reach Dandi on April 5. The next day, afto the seashore and picked up a handful of salt. Manufacturing of salt was illewhich is what he intended to do. He defied a law which, he said, was

could not afford the exorbitant taxes levied by the British government. With that handful of the naturally and abundantly available condiment, Gandhiji had sent a message to the rulers. The Civil Disobedience movement had started.

After Dandi, Gandhiji hoped to go to the Dharasana Salt Works in Gujarat, but was arrested by the police. Later, Sarojini Naidu led the marchers to Dharasana. The non-violent marchers were stopped by the police and were beaten up.

American journalist Web Miller met Gandhiji when he was launching the Dandi yatra. He stayed to cover it. He happened to witness the assault of the unarmed satyagrahis on May 21, 1930, where a few hundred died. His report helped the world opinion turn against the British rule in India.

The Salt Satyragraha, as the Dandi mission is also called, did not achieve its intended goal. The rulers did come to the discussion table, but the tax continued. It was eventually abolished in 1947.

Dandi revisited 91 years later

March 12, 2021, marked 91 years of the launch of the historic Dandi yatra. On this day, Prime Minister Narendra Modi flagged off a march from Sabarmati Ashram during which 81 people would retrace Gandhiji's steps to Dandi. The march ended on April 5 as per schedule.

On the occasion, PM Modi also announced the launch of the 75-year celebration of India's Independence, called 'Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsav'.
