More power to Abhi, Sameer

Just days after New Jersey lad Abhimanyu Mishra became youngest chess grandmaster, Sameer Banerjee lifted Junior Boys' Wimbledon trophy

We couldn't have felt prouder of our Indian-American identity than now. In the last issue, we told you about Abhimanyu Mishra, the 12-year-old Indian-American kid from New Jersey who is now the youngest chess Grandmaster in the world. He picked up the title on June 30. Abhi, as we would like to call him, has made not just the US but also his motherland India proud of him.

Now, we have another youngster to celebrate—Sameer Banerjee. The 17-year-old from New Jersey has entered the league of junior Wimbledon champions. He lifted the Wimbledon boys' singles trophy last week in his second junior Grand Slam tournament.

When he entered the tournament, Sameer wasn't even a favorite. His 19th rank was not enough to pitch him as a strong contender of the title. But on July 11, he defeated Victor Lilov to join a prestigious list of Junior Grand Slam winners representing the United States.

Back home in India, too, people cheered for their boy.

Sameer's father Kunal is from Assam and mother Usha from Andhra Pradesh. They migrated to the US in mid-1980s. Sameer was born in 2003.

"I really just wanted to win a round, I didn't expect this. I had a tough French Open, lost to a good player. So here I just wanted to keep my expectations low so that if I passed them, then I'd be happy. But this was way beyond my wildest dreams," he said to a round of applause from the crowd

Together, Abhi and Sameer have become the youngest flag-bearers for the Indian-American community.

Indian-American civilrights lawyer Seema Nanda has been confirmed by the US Senate as the solicitor for the Department of Labour. Nanda (48) has previously served as

chief of staff, deputy chief of staff and deputy solicitor in the department during the tenure of Barack Obama. Prior to that, she worked for 15 years in various roles as a labour and employment attorney.



Sirisha Bandla takes off on space flight

Last week, when aeronautical engineer Sirisha Bandla took off with Richard Branson and others on board Virgin Galactic's flight to space, she became only the third woman of Indian origin to fly to space. She follows the path first walked by Kalpana Chawla and Sunita Williams. Born in Andhra Pradesh in India, Bandla grew up in Houston.

The flight was delayed by 90 minutes due to bad weather. Just before the take-off, she tweeted, "I am so incredibly honoured to be a part of the amazing crew of #Unity22, and to be a part of a company whose mission is to make space available to all."



We are in war with virus, not Facebook: White House

Prez Biden holds ground on 'vaccine misinformation on social media'

#Washington

Following Facebook's rebuttal of US President Joe Biden's remark that social media platforms were killing people with vaccine misinformation, the latter on Monday chose to rephrase his words. However, he held on to his initial summary, saying that what he said was not to be taken literally, but as a challenge to do more to prevent spread of incorrect information regarding vaccine on social media platforms.

"Facebook isn't killing people," he said. "My hope is that Facebook — instead of taking it personally that somehow I'm saying Facebook is killing people — that they would do something about the misinformation, the outrageous misinformation about the vaccine. That's what I meant."

"We are not in a war or a battle with Facebook," said press secretary Jen Psaki, adding "We are in a war with the virus."

Last Thursday, US Surgeon General Vivek Murthy, in his first advisory since taking up the position, had said that vaccine misinformation was a factor responsible for slowing down of the country's vaccination rate. He had also called upon social media platforms to curb misinformation related to the pandemic and the vaccines.

A day later, Biden said that platforms like FB were killing people with misinformation, a comment that the latter has strongly objected to. A post on its website said FB was not the reason for US government missing the July 4 deadline to vaccinate 70% Americans.

"We permanently ban Pages, Groups, and accounts that repeatedly break our rules on COVID misinformation, and this includes more than a dozen Pages, Groups, and accounts from some of the individuals referenced in the press briefing," Facebook spokeswoman Dani Lever said in a statement Monday.

Spyware Pegasus caught snooping on 50k phones

Most of the phone numbers in data obtained by the Amnesty International are clustered in 11 countries, including India

The current big news from the digital world is the investigation into the leaked data from Israeli tech company NSO. Its spyware Pegasus has raked up lot of controversy this week.

NSO has claimed that Pegasus is intended for use against terrorists and criminals. Turns out they are not the only ones the spyware has been snooping on.

The investigation

The Pegasus Project is a ground-breaking collaboration by more than 80 journalists from 17 media organizations in 10 countries. The efforts are coordinated by Paris-based Forbidden Stories with the technical support of Amnesty International, which conducted forensic tests on mobile phones to identify

traces of the spyware. Around 50,000 phone numbers of potential targets have been leaked. These include heads of states, activists and journalists, including Jamal Khashoggi's family.

How it works

According to AI, Pegasus allows the hacker to gain access to messages, emails, media, microphone, camera, calls and contacts on the target's phone. Investigation has identified potential clients of NSO with clusters in 11 countries, namely Azerbaijan, Bahrain, Hungary, India, Kazakhstan, Mexico, Morocco, Rwanda, Saudi Arabia, Togo and UAE.

In India, the investigation is being done by The Wire.

Indian photojournalist killed in Afghanistan

Danish Siddiqui, an Indian photojournalist associated with news agency Reuters in India since 2010, was killed on July 16 while covering a clash between Afghan security forces and Taliban fighters near a border crossing with Pakistan. Danish, 38, is survived by his wife Rike and two children.

According to the Indian embassy in Kabul, Danish died of multiple gunshot wounds. He was embedded with Afghan Special Forces in Kandahar. On the fateful day, he was covering the clashes between the Taliban and the Afghan security forces. The Taliban denied any role in his death and expressed regret over the incident.

Danish was part of a team that was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for Feature Photography in 2018 for documenting the Rohingya refugee crisis in Myanmar.

Danish had also chronicled the Nepal

earthquake of 2015, the pro-democracy protests in Hong Kong in 2019, the communal riots that coincided with then US President Donald Trump's visit to New Delhi in February 2020, and the Covid-19 pandemic in India. He had also extensively covered the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq.

He was laid to rest in the graveyard of New Delhi's Jamia Millia Islamia, his alma mater, after his mortal remains were flown from Afghanistan on the evening of July 18.

UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres and Afghanistan President Ashraf Ghani also condoled Danish's death. Political leaders in India also condoled Danish's death.



Covid case rise: India drops to 4th place

Thanks to the consistently declining figures of daily cases of Covid-19, India has now dropped to the fourth place in terms of new cases reported in seven days ending last Friday. At the top of the list was Indonesia with 3.24 lakh cases, followed by Brazil with 2.87 lakh. UK was at the third position with 2.75 lakh while India reported 2.69 lakh cases during this period. However, the active caseload is over 4.2 lakh.

G'nagar gets India's 1st airport-like rly stn

The next time you go to Gandhinagar, you might want to visit the redeveloped railway station that was inaugurated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi last week. The premises, which gives the feel of an airport, boasts of state-of-the-art amenities, a five-star hotel, a centrally air-conditioned multipurpose hall, baby feeding room, prayer room as well as a first-aid room. Train-travelling be just one of the many features of this station, which aims to function as a city centre rail mall.



Govt cancels Kanwar Yatra after SC rap

The Uttar Pradesh government has announced cancellation of the Kanwar yatra this year, after initially giving it the go-ahead. The annual pilgrimage, which leads to one of the largest religious gatherings in the country every year, was called off after Supreme Court raised objection citing the likelihood of the third wave of the pandemic.

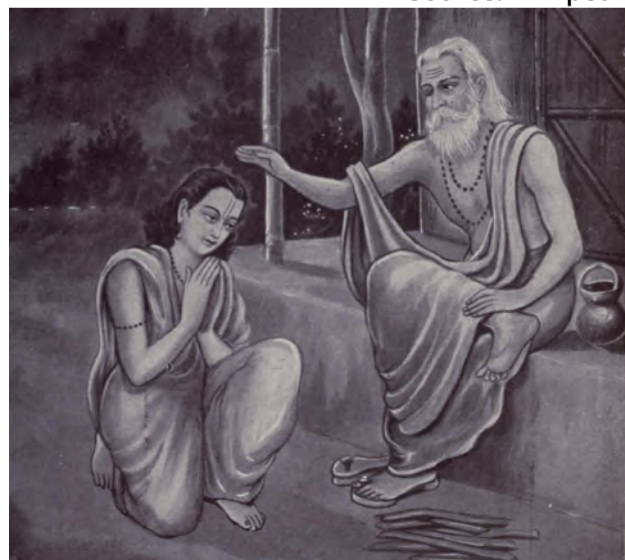
Why celebrate

AR Rahman and Ananya show the Hindustani Way

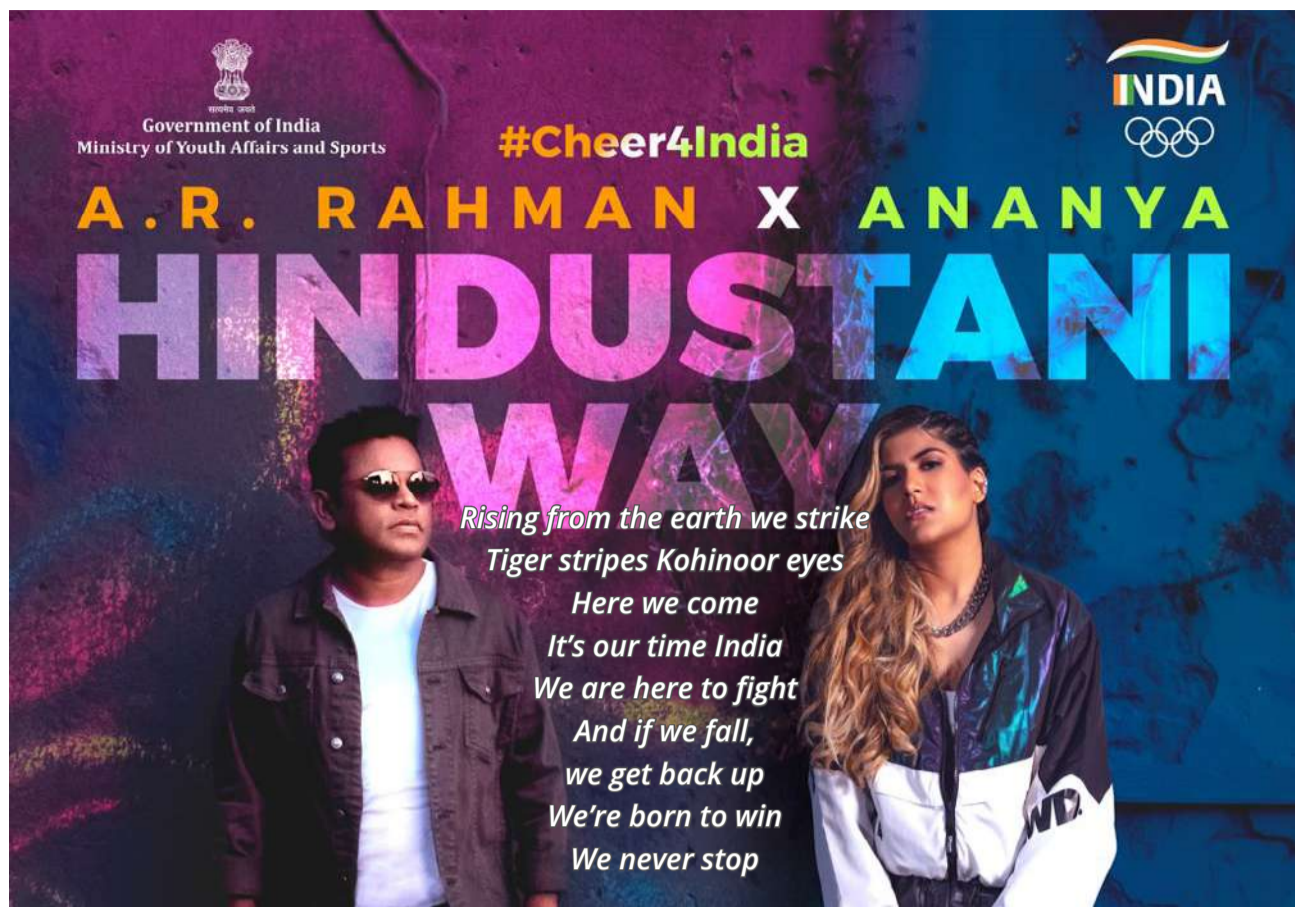
That's the title of the anthem the duo has prepared to cheer the Indian contingent at Tokyo Olympics 2020
